## 5 STEPS TO BECOMING MORE PLANT POWERED



#### **ADD IN THE GOOD STUFF**

Add in healthier foods to crowd out unhealthier choices. Incorporate veggies into all of your meals.

Work on getting 50-75% of your plate to be veggies/fruit.

#### **FOCUS ON NUTRIENT DENSITY**

Focus on foods that are high in antioxidants and fiber. If you stick with veggies, no need to count carbs/calories. Fill your plate with leafy greens, veggies, legumes, grains.

#### TRY NEW FOODS & PREPARATIONS

Try sautéing veggies in broth or water.

Try cashew based sauces instead of regular dairy cheese.

Try roasting, grilling or air-frying veggies and tofu.

#### **EXPLORE FLAVOR BOOSTERS**

Learn how to make healthy dressings and sauces. Spice up your dishes with garlic, cumin, turmeric, etc. Add flavor with fresh herbs, scallions, nuts and seeds.

#### Fill up on Nutrient Dense Foods



#### Leafy greens, cruciferous & other veggies

Enjoy salad greens, as well as kale, spinach, chard, arugula, etc., as well as antioxidant-rich cruciferous vegetables such as broccoli, cauliflower and brussels sprouts. Colorful vegetables such as beets, carrots and sweet potatoes are high in beta carotene for healthy eyes, skin, and hair.



#### Fruit

No need to feel guilty — fruit may be sweet, but it's also high in fiber and antioxidants. Berries and cherries are especially high in disease-fighting nutrients that also support healthy skin.



#### Beans and Legumes

Heart healthy beans and legumes are a great source of protein, fiber, iron, and zinc. Bean consumption has been associated with a healthier weight, lower blood pressure, blood sugar stabilization, and reduced risk of cancer.



#### Whole grains, nuts and seeds

Whole grains such as oats, brown rice, wild rice, and quinoa are high in fiber to support healthy digestion and support beneficial gut bacteria. Nuts and seeds, in small amounts, provide heart healthy fat, as well as extra protein.

Nuts and seeds: 1/4 c. per day

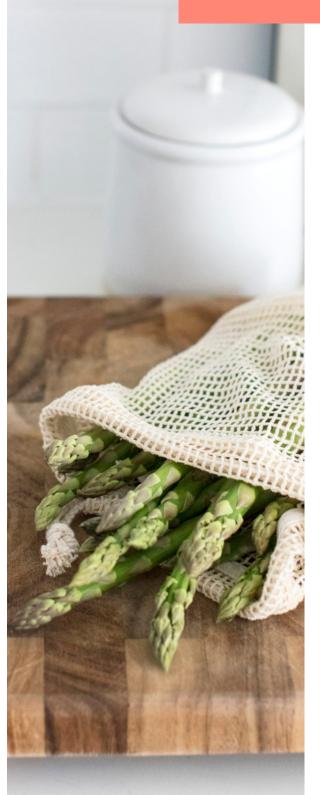

## Master the Simple Meal



## Reinvent your definition of fast food

Remember — when all else fails, these can be your go-to meals. For a super simple meal, go with beans, rice, sautéed greens, and some salsa. Or a baked potato bar!

- 1. Veggie Sauté: Chop whatever vegetables you have on hand. Drain some organic tofu and cut into cubes. Drizzle some olive oil into the pan and add the vegetables (optional: add some chopped onion or minced garlic). Sauté until crisp tender, then throw in the tofu or other protein. Stir gently and sauté until warmed through. Season with salt, pepper, gluten free tamari, gomasio (Japanese seasoning with sesame seeds, sea salt and seaweed), etc. Serve with sriracha or garlic chili paste if you like it spicy.
- 2. Loaded Salad: We eat tons of salads for dinner. That's why I always have a dressing or two in the fridge. Slice and chop whatever veggies you have on hand. Toss with the greens and dressing, and top with your favorite beans or some baked tofu or tempeh. Season with sea salt and pepper and add some avocado if you have it. For a heartier meal, add some roasted sweet potatoes, potatoes, rice, or quinoa.



#### Batch it out

If you set aside time to plan your weekly meals (and the ingredients you'll need to make those meals), you will be far more successful than if you wing it.

We're all busy, and I find that most people don't have the time or energy to cook a from-scratch meal every night.

That's why I like to batch it out whenever possible. On the weekends, that means spending time prepping veggies, and cooking grains and beans that'll be used for weeknight dinner prep.

Want to know what my weekend meal prep looks like? Turn the page

- Thu/Fri: plan meals for the week ahead
- Saturday: do your grocery shopping or ordering
- Sunday: spend 1-2 hours prepping veggies, etc.
- During the week: use your prepped veggies and precooked grains and proteins to cut down on meal prep time.

Protein intake is essential for building muscle, repairing tissues, producing enzymes, and a whole host of other functions in the body.

But most people in the U.S. actually consume far more protein than our bodies require — and that can cause serious issues such as kidney strain and high cholesterol.

People who are following a plant-based diet — or a mostly plant-based diet — will inevitably be asked by friends and family: where will you get your protein?



Here's the deal: most people don't need to obsess about protein — simply start making fruits and vegetables (along with beans and whole grains) your #1 dietary priority.

Because if you do, you'll be getting the fiber, antioxidants, phytonutrients, compounds, vitamins, minerals, and natural water content you need to thrive, as well as balance and heal the body.

Making fruits and vegetables the majority of your plate — and working in some beans and grains every day — will actually deliver adequate protein as well.

Bottom line, if you're eating enough calories, you're getting enough protein.

Protein deficiency is extremely rare in the U.S., and typically only occurs when people are literally malnourished or starving.

#### Sample Recipe: Easy Green Smoothie

#### Ingredients

- 2 cups filtered water
- 2 handfuls spinach
- 1 handful romaine
- 1/4 c. hemp seeds
- 2 TB almond butter
- dash vanilla extract
- 1 banana, frozen/chunks
- optional: 2 pitted dates

#### **Instructions**

Place ingredients into blender, adding frozen fruit and ice last.

Process until creamy and smooth. Add water a quarter-cup at a time if you want a thinner consistency.

Serve immediately or store some in fridge for later. Cheers!

#### Sample Recipe: Kale & Quinoa Salad

Prep Time: 10 Minutes, plus time to

marinate the kale

Serves: 4

#### Ingredients

- 1 bunch kale, stems removed
- 2 carrots grated or sliced into curls with a veggie peeler
- 2 tablespoon orange juice
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 3 tablespoons rice wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon maple syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon grated ginger
- 2/3 cup walnut oil (or extra virgin olive oil)
- sea salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup cooked quinoa
- 1 small red onion thinly sliced
- 1 cup dried blueberries or fresh blueberries
- 1 cup toasted walnuts



#### **Instructions**

First, make the dressing. Add the orange juice, lemon juice, rice wine vinegar, ginger, and maple syrup to a small bowl. Whisk until ingredients are incorporated. Then, while continuing to whisk, stream in the walnut oil. Add salt and pepper to taste.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the chopped kale and carrots. Add dressing and toss the salad gently until the leaves are evenly coated with dressing. Cover and refrigerate at least 3-4 hours or overnight. This helps soften the kale and add flavor.

Right before serving, add the quinoa, red onion, walnuts, and blueberries. Toss gently and serve. Garnish with additional berries if desired.



#### Sample Recipe: Thai Curry Cauliflower Soup

Prep Time: 30-45 Minutes

Serves: 4

#### Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon avocado oil
- ½ medium onion, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, sliced thinly
- 1 tablespoon Thai red curry paste, or more to taste
- ½ teaspoon grated ginger
- 1 medium/large head of organic cauliflower, separated into florets
- 2 cups low sodium vegetable broth
- 1 can (15 oz) light coconut milk
- 1/2 teaspoon maple syrup
- sea salt and pepper to taste
- 2 teaspoons rice vinegar
- Lime wedges for serving
- Garnish: corn kernels, thinly sliced radish, or minced mint

#### **Instructions**

Heat the oil in a medium pot over medium heat. Add the onion and sauté until translucent — about 5 minutes.

Add garlic, curry paste, and ginger. Stir so the garlic won't burn. Then add the broth, coconut milk, maple syrup, and cauliflower.

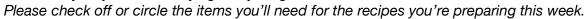
Bring to a boil, reduce the heat to low, and simmer for 10-15 minutes, or until the cauliflower is tender. Stir in the rice wine vinegar, and let cool for 5 minutes.

Working in batches, pour the soup into a blender. Remove the hole that's in the center of the blender lid so steam can escape during the blending process. Cover the lid with a towel (hot liquid tends to erupt), and blend on high.

Return the soup to the pot and warm gently to desired temperature. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Ladle into bowls and garnish with chopped herbs, if using.
